

## Park End Primary Pupil Premium Strategy Statement 2017-2018

Park End Primary School is a larger than average Primary School. A large number of pupils are eligible for Pupil Premium. This funding is based on pupils eligible for Free School Meals at any point in the past 6 years. In 2017-2018, 64% (based on 2016/2017 figures) of pupils trigger this funding mechanism, 2 are children looked after by the Local Authority. The additional funding is allocated to a range of initiatives to ensure pupils make good progress in learning, both academically and socially. There was a rise in the percentages of children achieving Reading, Writing, Maths and Combined at the end of KS2 in 2017 and progress of children eligible for pupil premium had also improved following this being a whole school priority in 2016/17.
